
Welcome from the Associate Directors' President

Exhibitors please note: There is no entry fee required. All entry forms and tags are available

at the Burnside Agriplex or online at <u>www.stratfordagriculturalsociety.com</u> For questions contact the SDAS Office 519-271-5130

- 1. Entries must be placed on Wednesday September 18, 2024, between 1 p.m. 8 p.m., in the Community Hall of the Stratford Rotary Complex.
- Exhibits must remain until 4 p.m. Sunday, September 22, 2024. DOORS TO THE EXHIBIT HALL WILL CLOSE AT 3 P.M. SUNDAY! DOORS WILL RE OPEN SUNDAY AT 4 P.M. Please be sure to pick up your exhibits between 4 p.m. and 5 p.m.
- 3. Students are required to fill out an entry tag for each entry including a class number, their name, and the name of their school.
- 4. Students must also fill out an entry form listing all classes entered. This form must also have their name, name of school and class(es) entered.
- 5. All entries must be the work property or product of the exhibitor, from his or her own farm or garden and produced in 2024, or results of your labour from a summer job on a farm.
- 6. Exhibitors to show in their grade as of June 30, 2024. Students beginning Jr. Kindergarten in September 2024 may also show.
- 7. One entry allowed per exhibitor per class, per section.
- 8. All entries are placed at owner's risk.
- 9. Open to all students and or residents of Stratford and surrounding areas.
- 10. Judges' decisions are final.
- 11. Prize money will be mailed out to exhibitors following the fair.

3. Glazed Citrus Doodles - 5 cookies on a plate Using the recipe below

Glazed Citrus Doodles Recipe	
2 3/4 cups all purpose flour	
1 tbsp baking powder	
1/4 tsp fine salt	
1 cup unsalted butter, room temperature	
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar	
2 tablespoons grated lemon zest plus 3 tbsp juice	
4 teaspoons lime zest plus 3 tbsp juice	
2 large eggs	
2 1/2 cups confectioners sugar	
Preheat oven to 350, with racks in upper and lower thirds. Whisk flour,	
baking powder and salt together. In a large bowl, using an electric mixer,	
beat butter, granulated sugar, 1 tablespoon lemon zest and 2 teaspoons	
lime zest on medium-high until pale and fluffy, 3 minutes, scraping down	
bowl as needed. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add flour mixture, beat to	
combine.	
Roll dough into 1-inch balls and place 2 inches apart, on parchment-lined	
baking sheets. Bake until edges are lightly golden, 12 to 15 minutes,	
rotating sheets halfway through. Let cool on sheets on wire racks for 5	
minutes, then transfer cookies to racks and let cool completely.	
Whisk together 1 tablespoon lemon zest, 2 teaspoons lime zest, citrus	
juices and confectioners sugar until smooth. With a small spoon, spread	
glaze over each cookie. Let stand for 1 hour yields 36 cookies.



- Exhibits must remain until 4 p.m. Sunday, September 22, 2024. DOORS TO THE EXHIBIT HALL WILL CLOSE AT 3 P.M. SUNDAY! DOORS WILL RE OPEN SUNDAY AT 4 P.M. Please be sure to pick up your exhibits between 4 p.m. and 5 p.m.
- 3. Entry forms and tickets are to be filled out by the exhibitor and all items must be listed on the entry form
- 4. The Stratford and District Agricultural Society is not responsible for unreadable entry tickets. If incorrect, they will be disqualified.
- 5. Entry forms must be brought accompanying the articles of entry.
- 6. All entry tags must be originals, printed from website or obtained in person on Wed. Sept. 18th.
- 7. All articles are to be the property of the member of the society and where there is no competition the judges report the article unworthy of a prize, directors shall have the power to withhold the same. Judges are particularly requested not to award prizes where they consider the articles unworthy. It is understood that no two or more members are to join exhibiting articles together. No person can judge his or her own property.
- 8. One entry allowed per exhibitor per class, per section, from each of Grains, Vegetables, Fruits, Flowers, Plants, Culinary Arts, Needlecraft, Woodworking, Photography, Hobbies and Crafts, Antiques and Collectibles and Christmas in September.
- 9. While the Officers and Directors of this Society will use every available means to prevent accidents in and about the grounds, it must be strictly understood that all persons going into or about the grounds must personally assume all risk of accidents or injury from any case whatsoever.
- 10. Where prizes awarded equals or exceed \$10.00 the 2025 membership fee will automatically be deducted from prize monies where applicable.
- 11. Only one prize will be allowed to an exhibitor in one section of any class. The SDAS reserves the right to conditionally accept or reject entirely any entry that may be received.
- 12. The farm or garden produce exhibited must be from the owner's farm or garden.
- 13. Any member violating the rules and by-laws of the Society will forfeit his or her premium in such cases and will be liable to a fine or expulsion from the Society at the discretion of the directors.



HAND QUILTED COMPETITION

1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.

2. The quilt must be solely made, and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.

3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.

4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.5. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.

The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt into the district competition.

9. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.

10. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.

11. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand quilts at each district competition.

12. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

MACHINE QUILTED COMPETITION Rules:

1.Please review the General Competition Rules document.

2. The quilt must be solely made, and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.

3.Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.

4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt. 5. The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.

6.It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.

7. The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.

District Competition

1.Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.

2.If the fair's best of show machine quilt classes has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt in the district competition.

3.An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.

4.If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.

5. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning machine quilts at each district competition.

6.A photo of the top three placed machine quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

Directions

1. It is recommended fabric be pre-washed.

2. Cut 2 pieces of flannelette approx. 31" x 31". Place one layer on top of the other, right sides together and stitch 5/8" seam around, leaving 6" opening for turning.

3. Trim one layer of seam to 1/2" to grade edges. Cut corners off diagonally. Turn right side out through 6" opening. Press so stitching line is at the very edge. Slip stitch 6" opening.

4. Stabilize edge (eg. machine stitch 1/2" from edge. etc.)

5. Flatten blanket and machine stitch 15" square in centre of fabric to make it more secure.



2. Preemie Hats - knitted or crocheted with baby yarn, no ribbons or ties

Directions

With 3.00mm needles cast on 80 sts

Work in (kb1,p1) ribbing for 3 1/4 inches

Change to 3.25 needles and work in St st for 2inches ending with right side facing for next row.

To Shape Top:

Row 1: (k8, k2 tog) 8 times

Row 2 and all even row: Pur 1

Row 3: (k7, k2 tog) 8 times

Row 5: (K6, k2 tog) 8 times

Row 7: (K5, k2 tog) 8 times



Continue decreasing in this manner until you have competed the row k2 tog 8 times. Break yarn and thread end through rem. 8 sts.

Finishing:

Sew back seam edge to edge. Weave in yarn ends on wrong side of work. Turn or roll up cuff.


