1. Entries must be placed on Wednesday September 23, 2026, between 1 p.m. – 8 p.m., in the Community Hall of the Stratford Rotary Complex.
2. Exhibits must remain until 4 p.m. Sunday, September 27, 2026. **DOORS TO THE EXHIBIT HALL WILL CLOSE AT 3 P.M. SUNDAY! DOORS WILL RE OPEN SUNDAY AT 4 P.M. Please be sure to pick up your exhibits between 4 p.m. and 5 p.m.**
3. Students are required to fill out an entry tag for each entry including a class number, their name, and the name of their school.
4. Students must also fill out an entry form listing all classes entered. This form must also have their name, name of school and class(es) entered.
5. All entries must be the work/property or product of the exhibitor, from his or her own farm or garden and produced in 2026, or results of your labour from a summer job on a farm.
6. Exhibitors to show in their grade as of June 30, 2026. Students beginning Jr. Kindergarten in September 2026 may also show.
7. One entry allowed per exhibitor per class, per section.
8. All entries are placed at owner's risk.
9. Open to all students and or residents of Stratford and surrounding areas.
10. Judges' decisions are final.
11. Prize money will be mailed out to exhibitors following the fair.

Section A - School & Class Displays

This is a non-competitive art and writing display using the Fair theme, "City Gardens and Country Fields".

Today, we are striving for the same goal, but now we tend to concentrate on educating the urban population about farming practices.

School Fair Recipe

Gluten-Free Double Chocolate Muffins

By: Audrey from Mama Knows Gluten Free

Servings:12 muffins

INGREDIENTS:

1½ cups gluten-free all-purpose flour

1 cup granulated sugar

½ teaspoon gluten-free baking powder

1 teaspoon baking soda

¼ teaspoon xanthan gum, leave out if your flour already has it

¼ teaspoon salt

½ cup cocoa powder

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

2 large eggs, room temperature

⅓ cup butter, melted, dairy-free use Smart Balance butter

1 cup milk, dairy-free use almond, cashew or coconut milk

½ cup gluten-free mini chocolate chips – can use dairy free

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Pre-heat oven to 350°F. Use baking cup liners or gluten-free cooking spray for the muffin pan.
2. In a large bowl add the all-purpose gluten-free flour, granulated sugar, gluten-free baking powder, baking soda, salt, xanthan gum (leave out if your flour already has it), and cocoa powder and whisk together to combine the ingredients.
3. Add the two eggs, pure vanilla extract, melted butter, and milk to the dry ingredients and mix until fully combined. Mix in the chocolate chips.
4. Scoop the batter into baking cups lined/cooking sprayed muffin tin. I like to use a greased ice cream scoop. I also sprinkle more chocolate chips on top of the batter.
5. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Please watch the muffins because all ovens are different. Allow the muffins to completely cool.
